



Health Share Pathways Prospective Provider Criteria

While the Health Share Pathways network is comprehensive, we are currently interested in contracting with behavioral health and substance use disorder providers who:

- Specialize in Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA) treatment services
- Provide psychiatric medication prescription and monitoring services, including for members diagnosed with SPMI
- Provide Intellectual Developmental Disabilities (IDD) Medication Management Services
- Provide Medication Assisted Treatment that is in line with Health Share's Regional Practice Guidelines and includes a comprehensive SUD treatment service array and the ability to work with members with varying levels of acuity.
- Provide Children's Sub-Acute Services

Health Share also seeks outpatient behavioral health providers who:

- Work in East Multnomah County and/or rural areas of Clackamas and Washington Counties or;
- Are co-located with a physical health group who is contracted with one or more of Health Share's four physical health plans to offer primary care service or;
- Are fluent in a foreign language (including ASL) and are able to provide the full spectrum of clinical services in that language or;
- Provide culturally competent Behavioral Health Services to a racial minority, an ethnic minority, and/or the LBGTQ+ community and have lived experience within the community served.

Outpatient providers who meet one or more of the criteria listed above must also:

- Offer a comprehensive service array and have the ability to work with members with varying levels of acuity (must be able to serve at minimum Levels A-C) and;
- Have established relationships with prescribers to meet urgent and ongoing medication needs and;
- Have the ability to provide appointment within 7 days of a hospital discharge and;
- Have the ability to provide crisis and after-hours access

All providers who wish to be part of the Pathways network must also:

- Have experience with Oregon Medicaid billing and operations
- Have appropriate experience and qualifications to provide services for which they are requesting a contract (to be verified in credentialing process)

All contracted Health Share Providers are required to follow federal and state laws and regulations related to providing services to OHP beneficiaries. The purpose of those laws and regulations is to ensure member safety and quality care. They include requirements related to credentialing; criminal records checks; fraud, waste and abuse; privacy; member rights; abuse reporting; grievance and appeals; record keeping standards and other applicable criteria.
